## EVENT REPORT | 2016 LAKE OF TEARS

Opera Kelowna performed its first commissioned opera by one of Canada's most renowned composers, Imant Raminsh, to animate the art of Kelownabased artist Jane Everett and the libretto of Lesley-Anne Evans. The recorded nature sounds of loons and water quieted the audience. Pianist Arnold Draper, Clarinetist Mary Norby and Flutist Christin Moore were conducted by Opera Kelowna's Artistic Director, Alexandra Babbel.

The operatic voices of Soprano Elizabeth Harris, Mezzo-Soprano Mia Harris, Tenor Tony Bittar and Baritone Andrew Stewart resonated in the atrium of the Rotary Centre for the Arts as the audience, surrounded by the installation of Everett's giant oil on vellum banners, loon wings, and painted canoe paddles sat back and enjoyed. The experience brought a music and art admiring audience together in an intimate and up-close

exposure to the cross-pollination of genres.

Composer Imant Raminsh demonstrated a high level of artistic merit in this composition. His long and fruitful career and his exemplary professional relationship with the ensembles of Alexandra Babbel culminated in this project.

Guests met and mingled with the composer, artist, librettist, stage director and cast along

with Mayor Colin and Leanne
Basran and numerous dignitaries
at the premiere performance and
reception of Lake of Tears on
February 20, 2016. The opera was
performed during the following
week for school-aged children
as an educational outreach
mandate. In addition, several
special interest groups were also
invited to the opera including
Karis Society and Metro Central
Drop In Centre, fulfilling Opera
Kelowna's mandate to reach a



diverse and inclusive audience. The brevity of the opera (35 minutes) allowed accessibility to many first-time opera attenders. Three additional performances occurred the evening of February 23, 2016. In total over 450 guests took in the sites and sounds of "The Lake of Tears."



Of special note was hair and make-up designer Missy
MacKintosh, who emulated loon-like features with stunning colours and feathers.

Future plans include a remounting of the opera in August 2017 as part of Opera Kelowna's summer opera series in celebration of Canada's 150 years.
